

FUEL FOR THOUGHT



The Ford Model A was introduced on December 2, 1927 to worldwide acclaim. Noted Ford historian Allan Nevins once said, **"By any standards of measurement, this rebirth of the Ford automobile must be** accounted one of the most striking achievements of the twentieth century industrial history. Indeed, a changeover of such scope and urgency was then unknown in [American industry]."

The Model A was the first complete car produced at Ford's River Rouge plant, a gigantic, vertically-integrated manufacturing complex located in Dearborn, Mich. At launch, the 1928 Model A line-up was comprised of eight body styles (plus an additional five commercial vehicle types), offered in a choice of seven exterior color schemes, at the time an almost unheard of variety for an all-new motor car. The new Ford's instant market success derived from its modest elegance, clever engineering, ease of maintenance, and dependability, traits that have helped secure its popularity for 95 years and counting.

New business

Decisions were taken on the following agenda items:

- After thoughtful discussion the members chose <u>Studebaker</u> as the <u>Featured Marque</u> for our 2023 Vintage Motorcar Meet. All stock, unmodified, pre- and post-war Studebaker vehicles will be eligible for this class, including the 1963-64 Studebaker Avanti and all Studebaker truck models. The last Studebakers were built in model year 1966. Note: "continuation" Avanti II's, built independent of Studebaker as from 1965, are excluded from the Featured Marque class.
- Members voted **not** to increase <u>Club dues</u> in March. Throughout 2023, dues will remain at \$20 for the basic membership with electronic delivery of the newsletter, and \$30 for those who opt to get a paper newsletter delivered by mail (if your email address is on file you also receive the newsletter via electronic delivery).
- Members voted to hold <u>future monthly business meetings</u> at Karl Helming's home garage in Portland on Saturday afternoons throughout the year EXCEPT for the May, June, July and September meetings, which will be held at the East Hampton Public Library on Wednesday evenings, and the "August" meeting that is traditionally held at the Haddam Neck Fairgrounds on the Wednesday evening prior to our Vintage Motor Car Meet (often the date of this meeting falls during the last week of July).
- <u>Election of officers for 2023</u> There were no nominations from the floor. A motion was made and passed to have the Club secretary cast a single vote, on behalf of the members, in favor of the Board of Directors proposal for a slate of officers that was presented in October:

Mark Hoydilla, President Ray Lichota, Vice President Peter Christianson, Secretary (incumbent) Cliff Baker, Treasurer (incumbent) Jon Grant, two-year term as a member-at-large on the Board of Directors Dan David, to fill the one year remaining on the other member-at-large seat on the Board (vacated)

No new activities were proposed.

Polly Beckwith confirmed that Farrell's will again cater our holiday party at the new location in Portland. The members decided to stay with the voluntary gift "grab bag" as introduced last year.

HOBBY HEADLINES & HISTORY

Connecticut Council of Car Clubs Chairman Passes Unexpectedly - John Bajumpaa, 67, died peacefully at his home in East Windsor on Dec. 3. John had been re-elected chairman of the organization at its most recent meeting in early November. Aside from his role as chairman, John managed the group's Facebook page and web site, including their on-line old car events calendar. He, along with his brother David (also on the board of the 4C's), was a member of the Studebaker Driver's Club. [BACC is a long-time active supporter of the 4C's.]

Corvair Museum Officially Recognized by General Motors - The Corvair Preservation Museum on Rte. 66 in Glenarm, Ill. announced that it has been approved by GM as the official Corvair museum for North America. Underway 50 Years Ago: Phase-In of Tougher Bumper Standards - Cars built for the U.S. market had to have stronger bumpers beginning in 1973. Standards were toughened in 1974 and again in 1979, making the decade of the 1970's the one in which the styling for a given vehicle package began to be dictated by more than just aesthetics and product cost. Car designers then had to cope with additional demands associated with downsizing and aerodynamics in order to reduce fuel consumption. It took nearly two decades, helped by some regulatory relief and the introduction of new materials and better manufacturing quality, for automobile design to blossom once again.

The correct answer to Who, What, Where, or When in the last issue, **"Two, unrelated, OHC in-line six-cylinder engines were produced in the U.S. between WWII and 1970. Identify them and the five vehicle lines in which they were offered.":**

One engine was the **Tornado OHC six developed by Kaiser Jeep Corp.** that was offered in the mid-1962-1965 Willys Jeep Station Wagon and Pickup models, the 1963-1964 Jeep Wagoneer line, and, the 1963-1964 Jeep Gladiator pickups (with continued availability in military versions through 1969).

The second engine was the **Pontiac OHC six offered by Pontiac Div. of General Motors** in the 1966-69 Pontiac Tempest and Tempest Sprint models, and the 1967-69 Pontiac Firebird and Firebird Sprint models.
