FUEL FOR THOUGHT

"To fully appreciate the impact my great-grandfather had on people's lives, you have to understand what life was like when he started his company. In 1903, there were only 8,000 cars in the United States and less than 150 miles of paved road. The average wage was 22 cents an hour. Most people rarely traveled more than 25 miles from home



in their entire lifetime.

To build cars for what he called 'the great multitude,' Henry Ford worked on a series of progressively better-designed and lower-priced cars. Finally, in 1908 he introduced his automotive masterpiece: the Model T. The Model T was simple, affordable, and reliable. It changed the way we live, work, and play, providing mobility and prosperity on an undreamed-of scale. In time, it became an integral part of everyday life, popular culture, and even our language. ...The Model T is assured of its place in history - and in the hearts of automotive enthusiasts around the world."

A new supply of our event business cards was printed by *Karl Helming* and cards were available for the taking at the meeting.

Peter Christianson brought some copies of the updated judging form for the Vintage Motorcar Meet reflecting the points redistribution from Undercarriage and the minimum 70 points to be eligible for a first place trophy.

New business

Preparations for our upcoming Vintage Motorcar Meet were reviewed. *Alan Carlson* ran down a list of event responsibilities to try to determine who is going to be in charge of what. Some were more clearly defined than others, namely field set-up (*Karl Helming, Jon Grant, Ralph Phil* et al), the spectator gate (*Elaine Grant*), show car registration (*Dan David*), announcing (*Steve Rossi*, with PA system tech support from *Peter Christianson*), judging (*Jon Grant*), and trophy presentation (*Polly Beckwith* and *Alan Carlson*). Less well-defined were management of the flea market, traffic control and spectator parking, and show car parking. Members will be needed to staff all areas. Some meeting attendees declared an interest to volunteer as each area was discussed. The judging teams will be set at the next meeting on August 3rd.

Scott Macgregor has ordered the plaques but has not received them yet. Jackie Reardon said she would do some promotion of the upcoming show on Facebook. Alan reported that Mark Aldieri (absent due to moving into his new house that weekend) told him that all but the last part of the publicity schedule - local newspaper promotion - has been completed. [Material has since been sent to East Haddam News and the Glastonbury Citizen/Rivereast weeklies - *Ed*.] Dan David suggested that we have the show flyer available earlier next year so it can be distributed to the on-line calendars that typically will include them as links in event postings.

Regarding the revised list of classes, questions came up about the definition of Full Classics and Sports & GT Cars. Full Classics encompasses the list of 1915-1948 luxury makes and models approved by the Classic Car Club of America (their official list will be used at registration). Sports & GT is comprised of post-war two seat and 2+2 sports and GT cars. The definition is unchanged from last year. It includes Corvettes, 2-seat T-Birds, Kaiser Darrins, Nash-Healeys, AMXs and numerous imported sports cars. Note that re-creations (such as the Jaguar C-Type continuation car we registered last year) and replica kit cars (including all reproduction Cobras) will be directed to the new non-judged class for Unclassified Vehicles. [As always, the judged classes in our event are intended to be for stock, unmodified cars and trucks as they were originally manufactured and sold. During registration we make some allowances for period accessories and safety upgrades such as radial tires, and each judging team shall take those into consideration consistently within their assigned class. - *Ed*.]

Regarding the Featured Marque Class - this year dedicated to the Ford Model T - *Richard Beckwith* noted that he was bringing one of his and he had talked to Model T owners in the Crankin' Yanks Club and C.H.A.S. about entering their cars as well. He expects a good response from them. Another club has a cutaway Model T engine that they agreed to bring. *Jay Beveridge* will contact a man from Essex with a Model T. *Dan David* gave a list of BACC members who are believed to own Model Ts to *Alan Carlson* for whatever follow up he wishes to make.

There will be four special trophies at this year's show. All show vehicles are eligible for these subjective awards except for those in the Modified & Non-Stock Vehicles Class (hot rods, customs, dune buggies, Neo-Classics). The President's Award will be chosen by *Alan Carlson*, the Announcer's Trophy by *Steve Rossi*, the Award in Memory of Bob Helming by *Karl Helming*, and the Award in Memory of Bill Reardon (new) by *Jackie Reardon*.

Summer tours and activities

Don Liepelt changed the date of his old car Patriot's Tour to the Nathan Hale Homestead to Sunday, July 17 owing to a parade in East Hampton on the previous day.

Diane Baker explained that the correct date for the member car show and hot dog cook-out at Masonicare at Chester Village is Thursday, July 28.

Jon Grant proposed a tour to the workshop of a restorer he knows in Killingworth. We could have a picnic there. Meeting consensus was to do it August 27 or 28. [*Don Liepelt* will make the arrangements. - *Ed*.]

Next meetings and locations

- The August meeting will be held as usual on the Wednesday before our car show, August 3, at the Haddam Neck Fairgrounds at 6:30 pm.

- The dates and locations for the September and October meetings are still TBD. Typically the September meeting includes a pot-luck meal.

HOBBY HEADLINES & HISTORY

First Saab Car Debuted 75 Years Ago - SAAB, the Swedish aircraft manufacturer, decided to diversify after WWII. They would focus their aircraft business primarily on making jets for the military while setting up a separate division to produce automobiles for the civilian market. The first running prototype, known as Ursaab, was shown to the press in June of 1947. It was further developed and was launched on the home market in 1949 as the Saab 92. In spring, 1956 three Saabs were displayed at the New York Auto Show, after which sales began in the U.S. market. Saab and Scania truck joined forces in 1969, a merger that would last until 1990 when General Motors bought a controlling interest in Saab Automobile. GM took full ownership a decade later, but was unable to turn the company to

profitability in the midst of its own global challenges and ultimate bankruptcy. Saab was optimistic about its chances after having been sold to Spyker in January, 2010, however, it all came to naught by 2012 when the money ran out.

95 Years Ago an Era Ended and Another Began - The Ford Model T went out of production in 1927, some 19 years after the first ones were built. 1927 also marked the formation of the General Motors Art and Color Section., later renamed GM Styling. Harley Earl was brought in to run it and ended up doing so for three trend-setting decades.

CHANGES, FOR THE BETTER

Unmuffled Exhaust from the Editor

The Ford Model T was blessed with an innovative and enduring basic mechanical design all its own, as was true of other quintessential "people's cars" such as the VW Beetle and Citroen 2CV that became popular two decades later. Even so, the Model T was subject to numerous changes throughout its long production run. From 1908 to 1927, the Ford car was continuously improved in terms of durability and reliability - often based on real world customer experience. Other changes were made to reduce assembly time and material cost, and to make the car more attractive to buyers in terms of practicality or appearance. It was still a Model T, just better and more affordable as time went on.

Wood bodies soon gave way to metal ones (mostly steel) over hardwood framing. Lamp housings and radiator shells that were originally made of brass were replaced by black-painted steel during WWI, and then, in 1926, by nickel-plated steel. A redesign in 1917 included a taller radiator and a more rounded hood that met the tapered cowl. Over time the height of Model T bodies was lowered and the original flat fenders became more curved and sculptured. Exterior color options existed from the early days to 1913, at which time black famously became the only choice on the menu until the improved 1926 models came out and body color options reappeared.

Early Model Ts were crank-started by hand and had acetylene headlamps. Electric lamps arrived in 1915 and an electric starter was first offered in 1919, battery (and charging system) included. The Touring model that retailed for \$850 in 1909 was priced as low as \$290 by 1925; at the end of the run in 1927 it had risen to \$380.

Let's hope we will see examples of Model Ts from throughout its evolution when it will be the Featured Marque at the Belltown Vintage Motorcar Meet on August 7. Pay attention to the differences from one car to the next and you will begin to appreciate the arc of Model T history and the effort Ford made to maintain its all-important value proposition.



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By the Way...

Here is a summary of "what's new" at our 55th Annual Vintage Motorcar Meet:

- The judged class count has been reduced from 24 to 17, in part by eliminating separate classes for open cars
- Classes for heavy commercial trucks, fire trucks and military vehicles have been dropped
- A "Featured Marque" class has been added; this year the spotlight will be on Ford Model Ts
- Entries in the Featured Marque class will be admitted FREE of charge
- The 40-year rule means that 1982 model year cars and trucks are now eligible
- The show field has been rearranged to concentrate more pre-war vehicles in the area most visible to spectators, to their right as they enter the fairgrounds; the field to the left will now only be used for unclassified vehicles and hot rods (no judging teams will visit this area)
- The class markers on the field will identify the class (e.g. Cars, 1955-1959) in addition to the class letter (H)
- The new display-only category for unclassified vehicles includes re-creations, replica kit cars, tributes, stock vehicles whose drivers do not want to park in class *for whatever reason*, and stock vehicles that arrive too late to be judged (not in the registration lane by 11 a.m.)
- The judging points for undercarriage have been reduced and those points reallocated to lighting and glass
- In order to qualify for a first place trophy in class, a car must score at least 70 points out of a possible 100
- With the addition of the Bill Reardon Trophy, the number of special awards is back up to four
- Cars and trucks in the 17 judged classes as well as Unclassified Vehicles (but not hot rods) are eligible for the special awards (President's Trophy, Announcer's Trophy, Bob Helming Trophy and Bill Reardon Trophy)
- A maximum of 55 trophies will be handed out at the awards presentation at the conclusion of the Meet, vs a possible 75 last year



Note to GPS users:

You must use East Hampton's ZIP Code 06424. (Using Haddam's ZIP Code will take you across the CT River to the west side, 20 miles away!) Google Maps: 41º 30 44.75 N and 72º 30 56.21 W

From the Middletown-Portland Arrigoni Bridge:

- Follow Route 66 East for 5.5 miles to the intersection of Route 151 South.
- Follow Rt 151 South for 3.4 miles to the intersection of Haddam Neck Road on the right.
- Follow Haddam Neck Road for 1 mile to the Fairgrounds on your left.

From the East Haddam Swing Bridge: Take an immediate left onto Route 149 North.

- Follow Route 149 for 3.3 miles to the intersection of Route 151 North.
- Follow Route 151 for 4.3 miles to the intersection of Haddam Neck Road on the Left.


