CLUB NOTES

The first BACC business meeting of 2022 was held January 8. In addition to all four Club officers for 2022, about 20 members and associate members were in attendance. Our thanks go to Karl Helming for hosting it.

Treasurer Cliff Baker noted that Chubb Insurance indicated that our premium was scheduled to increase 69% at renewal. Although that is still well below what we were quoted by our previous insurer last year, Cliff will investigate alternatives with our insurance agent.

Alan Carlson opened the meeting by having the members present each introduce themselves and say a word or two about their position with the Club and the cars they own. Unexpectedly, Don Liepelt had a lot he wanted to share and it served as a fine substitute for not having a guest speaker this month.

Miscellaneous updates:

- Secretary *Peter Christianson* said he would build a duplicate member email mailing list to the one used by Dan David for Club announcements in order to have a back-up capability for this function. [This arose from an off-the-record discussion prior the meeting. - Ed.]
- A 'Thank You' letter was received from the Newtown Lions Club for allowing them to display their Ford Mustang raffle car at last year's Vintage Motorcar Meet. The car was won by a man from Toms River, N.J. They hope to display their 2022 raffle car at our Meet in August. We say, "Please come again."

- Charley Hnilicka was absent due to having tested positive for COVID-19. We heard that he had sold three of his four cars prior to his pending move to Belfast, Maine to live with his daughter Lainie [the fourth, a 1928 Chevrolet AB was also sold, later in January ... see p. 5 Ed.]. Although we will miss seeing Charley as often as we were used to, we are delighted that he has renewed his Belltown membership.
- As this issue went to press, a small number of members have not yet paid their dues for 2022. Renewals received on or after March 1, 2022 are subject to the higher dues levels approved at the Annual Meeting in November, i.e., \$20 for the basic membership with all-digital communication or \$30 including printed newsletters mailed via the USPS. An updated membership renewal form with the new dues levels will be posted on the web site in mid-February.
- ♦ Thanks go to *Peter Christianson* for updating our Constitution and Bylaws with the changes approved in late 2019 and late 2021, and to *Ralph Phil* for posting the document on the BACC web site. - Jon Grant said he wants to propose term limits for Club officers at the next Board of Directors meeting. Last year the Board approved a term limit for elected members of the Board. Jon strongly believes that it would be good for the Club if more members participated in taking on leadership roles. Anyone who might have some reservations about becoming an officer (or board member) can be assured that current and former Club leaders are always willing to share their experience and be a resource for them.
- Regarding this year's VMM, *Ralph Phil* showed his mock-up of a new show field car class location sign that displays the class description in addition to class letter, as suggested last year by *Rick Scott*. Ralph will incorporate feedback from the meeting.
- *Don Liepelt* offered his vintage camping trailer as a potential display item at VMM along with a cutaway Model T transmission on the assumption that we make the Ford Model T our "featured marque" this year.

April Antique Engine & Tractor Meet:

Jon Grant has not yet sought a permit from the State to hold this event at the old Fireman's Grounds at the entrance to Salmon River State Forest. It doesn't seem like a sure thing as it looks today, but the situation is apt to change. When the COVID trends turn more favorable he will take this up with them.

Other activities:

Alan Carlson asked that if anyone has an idea for a tour, or destination trip, to please bring it up at the next meeting. We need to be mindful of the soon-to-commence major reconstruction of the Swing Bridge between Haddam and East Haddam, and the state's intention to construct two roundabouts on the Haddam side. Don Liepelt volunteered to work on laying out a Spring driving tour.

Lastly, Alan asked if we wanted to revert to holding our monthly meetings at the East Hampton Library on Wednesday evenings once we get clearance from the library to do so. One alternative is to hold them there during the late Spring and Summer so they would not conflict with other weekend activities, and hold them elsewhere, e.g. at Karl's, on Saturday afternoons the rest of the year so older members don't have to drive to and from the meetings in darkness and working members are more apt to be able to attend. There was interest in a split schedule although no final decision was made.

Our next meeting will be at Karl's on Saturday, February 5, and it will begin with a Pot-Luck Lunch at 12:30 p.m. BACC will provide eating utensils, paper plates, cups and napkins. Please bring an entrée or dessert for the buffet (with serving utensils, if required), or, a large-size soft drink or two to share. Bring along a bottle of water for yourself if that is your drink of choice. Coffee will be available.



<u>Fun Facts</u>: The 1928 Chevrolets were longer than in 1927, with a 4 in. increase in wheelbase. Their demountable wheel rims were widened to 3" and available with either wood-spoke or solid disc centers. 1928 was the last year before the six-cylinder engine was introduced. The 171 c.i.d. in-line four-cylinder developed 35 hp at 2,200 rpm. According to *The Standard Catalog of American Cars*, nearly 1.2 million Chevrolets were produced for 1928, outselling the Ford Model A in its debut year.

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HOBBY HEADLINES & HISTORY

First Bentley Customer Car Delivered 100 Years Ago - A 3-Liter Bentley saloon with aluminum bodywork and brass trim, chassis number 1, was the first Bentley delivered to a new car customer. The buyer, a wealthy Londoner named Noel van Raalte who was passionate about auto racing, paid £1,150 for it in November, 1921. In celebrating the 100th anniversary of the occasion, Bentley announced that it has sold over 200,000 cars since then and it claims that 84% of those sold in the U.K. are still in existence. Bentley Motors was founded by W.O. Bentley 102 years ago.



Ford Motor Company Making Progress on Restoration of Michigan Central Station - In June, 2018 Ford announced that it bought the iconic, but dilapidated and long-shuttered passenger rail station and adjacent property in the



Corktown neighborhood of Detroit for \$90 million, with the intention of creating "an innovation hub for Ford's vision of the future of transportation." The company recently gave the media a tour of the restoration work in progress, which is extensive to say the least. Ford is also in the process of revamping its facilities in Dearborn, including the engineering campus and its corporate headquarters known as "The Glass House" (all this despite COVID-19 having forced many employees to work from home). Will all of that new office space make sense for Ford Motor Co. in the future "new normal?" We'll see... No matter what, history buffs will appreciate Bill Ford's commitment to reviving the city of Detroit, in

this case in Corktown, by saving and repurposing important structures that date to the heyday of the Motor City.

Mecum Auctions Breaks World Record at Kissimmee - Sales at Mecum's lead-off auction for 2022 registered \$217 million, the highest ever seen for a single live collector car auction, breaking the previous record of \$176 million, according to the company. In all, thirteen vehicles sold for over a million dollars apiece at the Florida event. A total of 2,954 cars and trucks found new owners (also a record), with a sell-through rate of 90%. If you got to watch any of the Mecum action live on MotorTrend TV you know it was positively crazy from start to finish!




