Each month, *Ford Times*, the company-produced magazine for Ford owners and enthusiasts, included favorite recipes from selected restaurants from around the U.S. Periodically these recipes were collected and published in a cookbook entitled *Ford Treasury of Favorite Recipes from Famous Eating Places*, later editions renamed *The Ford Times Cookbook*. These cookbooks were meant to serve as "a traveler's guide to good eating at home and on the road." *Ford Times* was published until January, 1993.

# **CLUB NOTES**

Our tenth business meeting of 2023 was held on October 7 at Karl Helming's garage. Treasurer *Cliff Baker* was absent and *Peter Christianson* gave a brief treasurer's report on Cliff's behalf. Peter also reported on the board of directors meeting held on September 28 [all seven directors were present at that meeting].

#### **Board Meeting**

Peter stated that BACC's by-laws require a review of the Club's books by two members be conducted annually and reported to the membership at the January meeting. This has not been done in quite some time. *Bill Nitschke* and *Phil Schuster* volunteered to do it and will make arrangements with Cliff. Peter also noted that there are a couple of references in the by-laws that it was agreed should be made gender-neutral and this will be done in the near future.

The board discussed purchasing the 14' trailer formerly owned by the AACA-CCR club to use as a replacement for the old stationary storage trailer located on the Reardon property. After considering the costs to purchase, register and maintain the new trailer and the advantages of having such a trailer to take our equipment to our event venues, the board recommended approval of the purchase from *Ray Lichota*, who is the current owner.

The board reviewed the current situation with regard to publication costs versus the income generated by member dues, including the higher dues charged to those who want a paper newsletter. The board recommended that there be no increase in dues for 2024.

Those on the board who are up for election at the November meeting (the Annual Meeting) all stated that they were willing to stay in their positions (none are term-limited this cycle) except for *Dan David*, who said he is stepping aside to give an opportunity for another member to serve.

#### New Business

Members approved the board recommendation to purchase the AACA-CCR trailer for \$2,600 plus an allocation of up to \$500 for needed repairs. *Karl Helming* volunteered to maintain the trailer and store it on his property.

There was a discussion at Hershey about the necessity for the officers of a 501 (c)3 non-profit such as BACC to be bonded to shield them from any litigation against the Club. For example, ACCA regional club officers are so protected under AACA's umbrella insurance policy. *Cliff Baker* is aware of this recommendation and will look into it. This would be in addition to our current insurance coverage and would protect all board members from liability, by name.

Regarding the <u>election of officers</u> at the November meeting, the willingness of the current officers to remain in place for another year notwithstanding, anyone who is interested in running for office can still do so up until the time of the election. So far only *Polly Beckwith* has declared an interest in the open seat on the board.

We need to decide on a <u>Featured Marque</u> for next year's Vintage Motorcar Meet at the November meeting. There was a proposal to also select one for the 2025 event as well. Suggestions have so far included Hudson, Hudson + Nash (the predecessors of AMC), Ford Mustang (2024 marks 60 years since the debut of the Mustang) and Cars Made in Connecticut (Columbia, Corbin, Locomobile, Trumbull et al). Concerns are that we can attract enough cars to the class or, conversely, that we are overwhelmed. If Hudsons and/or Nashes are thought to be too scarce we might consider Rambler, which was a brand that spanned 1950 to 1969 and was used by Nash, then Hudson and Nash, and finally, by AMC. As for the Connecticut Cars suggestion, we ought to discuss this with Klingberg since they have featured them in their previous shows. If their event is on hiatus for another year it might be an opportune time for us to showcase such cars. Moreover, Klingberg might help us get in touch with the owners. Another suggestion was to go with Cars Made in New England, which would add a few more early makes and could bolster the car count somewhat.

There was further discussion of the field layout for the August Meet and the show car classifications. *Dan David* said he already planned to move Featured Marque to Class A and move the truck classes to the end of the list. He did not anticipate making other class changes. Revisions will be need to be finalized before the show flyer can be produced.

#### **Upcoming Club Activities**

BACC's <u>holiday party</u> will be held on Saturday, December 9 beginning at 1 p.m. **There will be no postponement in case of bad weather.** The location will be the same as last year - the Lutheran Fellowship Hall in Portland. The venue will be open at 10 a.m. on the day of the party for set-up. Polly said that Farrell's will be the caterer as in past years. *Dan David* suggested she look into tweaking the menu choices, in keeping with the usual triad of beef-chicken-fish. Those who bring a \$10 wrapped gift for the grab bag will be able to participate in the gift lottery. Polly asks that if your gift is male or female-specific, please mark it so. Polly will invite members of C.H.A.S. who are not also in BACC.

*Richard Beckwith* mentioned that he spoke with Mike Goldblatt of the Yankee Yesteryear Club at Hershey and Mike offered to have us back for another tour of his garage in Norwich. He has some new cars to show. Members were interested so we will propose something at an upcoming meeting.



#### French Car Collector and Museum Director Peter Mullin Has Died

California businessman, philanthropist, and pre-war French car expert Peter Mullin passed away on Sept. 18 at age 82. He was the founder and director of the Mullin Automotive Museum in Oxnard, Calif., and a former chairman of the Petersen Museum in Los Angeles. The Mullin Museum houses an extraordinary collection of French machines from what might be termed the "art deco era" and earlier. His wife Merle will continue to oversee the museum. They have 24 employees, carry 14,000 part numbers, and even manufacture upholstery sets and numerous mechanical parts.

In checking this out, I learned that during his early driving career, Shelby raced a friend's MG TC in 1952 and drove an Austin-Healey for Donald Healey's team in 1954, including setting records at Bonneville. However, Shelby's private drives in an MG and early Healeys predated the consolidation of those brands into British Leyland by well over a decade. So, he never did any business with BLMC. "Thanks Richard, but no cigar!"



# WHO, WHAT, WHERE OR WHEN

Challenge your automotive history IQ

Milwaukee Junction is known in some circles as the "cradle of the auto industry." Where is it located and which companies established automobile assembly plants there some twelve decades ago?

The correct answer to Who, What, Where, or When in the last issue, **"Which company is, arguably, the earliest** ancestor of Stellantis in America?": <u>Answer</u> - *Thomas B. Jeffery Co.* 

The <u>Thomas B. Jeffrey Co.</u> built its first cars (the original "Rambler") in Kenosha, Wisc. in 1902. The company was bought by Charles Nash in 1916 and renamed Nash Motors the following year. Nash merged with Hudson to form AMC in 1954. AMC was bought by Chrysler in 1987, Chrysler merged with Fiat in 2009 to form FCA, and FCA merged with PSA in 2021 to form what came to be called Stellantis.

The other three companies, also American ancestors of Stellantis, got their starts as automobile producers later - <u>Maxwell-Briscoe</u> in 1904, <u>Hudson Motor Car</u> in 1909, and <u>Dodge Brothers</u> in 1914.

### BY THE WAY ...

Try this recipe from the Botsford Inn, Farmington, Mich. (once owned and restored by Henry Ford) -

### Egg Nog Pie

Place in a double boiler: 2 cups milk, 3/4 cup sugar and a pinch of salt. Cook until hot.

Separate 4 eggs and combine yolks with 2 tablespoons cornstarch and beat well. Add yolks to hot milk mixture.

Flavor with 3 tablespoons rum. Cook until mixture thickens, stirring occasionally. Just before removing from heat, beat 2 egg whites with 2 tablespoons sugar until stiff. Pour into custard.

Pour into 8-inch baked pie shell and chill.

Sprinkle with nutmeg and top with whipped cream before serving.
